Director's Review

We often complain about our summers but 'wow' this one has been a very good one hasn't it? I am also delighted to say that it has been a cracking good one for the Belvoir Castle Cricket Trust with another 2,296 children coming through our programmes.

One of the things we have done this year is to put our work into pictures. With the help of 'The Video Whisperer' aka Joe Caneen we have put together a promotional video which absolutely took my breath away when I first saw it.

Sometimes when you are involved in something every day and get bogged down with the detail we forget what we do. The video tells the story of the Belvoir Castle Cricket Trust and documents our various projects. The thing that struck me the most was the smiling faces of our children and also the smiling faces of our staff and volunteers — who says work can't be fun? I really hope you will take the time to take a look at our video and share the enjoyment. It can be found on you tube by typing in Belvoir Castle Cricket Trust.



I truly hope that our children continue to be inspired by being involved in our work and that that in turn this will allow them to aspire to be the best that they can be.

One story that I would like to share with you is the story of Melton Mowbray cricket club. Five years ago a chap by the name of Rupert Smallshaw answered an advert of mine that we were looking for local clubs with no junior sections with the idea of us helping to kick start one. They were a club a bit down on themselves. Formerly a thriving town club they had only one Saturday side a struggling Sunday side with no junior cricket and possibly no future.

We worked hard to find and train their club members to become coaches, we went into local schools attending assemblies and we set plans to help develop their club. I will never forget our first training night when we had 12 volunteer coaches and 8 children! It is fair to say I received some slightly concerned looks.

4 years later the club is thriving because they took the time and the effort to invest in their future. They now have 2 senior teams on a Saturday, 1 on a Sunday, 2 junior quick cricket teams at under 10's and teams at under 11's and under 13's and in 2015 they will be running an under

15's team. Indeed 5 of our initial intake of Melton Belvoir Bees are now playing senior cricket. They have a fantastic coaching team led by Carl Tew and Peter Hood, supported by Belvoir Castle Cricket Trust staff coach Keith Tomblin and a fantastic support team of Mum's and other volunteers which are really putting the club on the map.

It just shows what can be achieved with good people around you.

I can certainly vouch for that and I would like to say a personal thank you to Neil Atkins my Assistant Director, to our Chairman Phil O'Brien, Patron Her Grace the Duchess of Rutland, to our Trustees but most of all to our volunteers and supporters, we would be lost without you. We have received some tremendous support with the ever challenging need to fund raising and special mention should go to Her Grace the Duchess of Rutland for allowing us to be the benefitting charity of the Belvoir Castle Charity Clay shoot, to my good friend Graeme Swann who made a significant donation to the BCCT from his Benefit Year, to the MCC for their continued support and there are many others who deserve a mention but alas I am running out of space. They will be mentioned later. We will not rest on our achievements and we strive to get better at what we do. So to finish I would like to say A huge thank you to all our 'Friends'

- 7 venues across Leicestershire & Lincolnshire
- giving children, 6-11 years, the opportunity to play sport and learn skills on a regular basis
- encouraging involvement of adult volunteers in sports activities
- involving all members of the family in the activities through social interaction in a rural community

Belvoir Bee's coaching took place at 7 rural/small town venues. These sessions provide an opportunity for children to participate in sport, learn new skills and improve on ones already gained. Groups are split into age / ability aroups so children can not only develop at their own pace but enables the more talented to develop a little further. With volunteers from the local club assisting at the venues this enables the clubs to develop their junior sections whilst giving the children exit routes to more competitive cricket.

The bee's sessions promote inclusion and regular 90 minutes activity on a weekly basis for 20 weeks through the summer months.

The Belvoir Bees continues to help & support the development of local community volunteers. Adults from the local club & parents take part in training sessions to develop them as volunteers. This enables them to assist with the sessions and contribute to their local community activities.

During 2014 the Belvoir Bees had the support of 28 local volunteers helping with sports coaching & administration of the sessions.

The sessions provide a focussed way for local families to meet and generally become more involved in developing their community. Through the introduction and running of the Belvoir Bees, the Trust has been instrumental in the regeneration of small, rural and in some cases failing cricket clubs by working with them to develop sustainable junior cricket sections and enabling a pathway for youngsters to access competitive junior cricket:



This year the Trust ran a friendly Kwik cricket tournament of which 5 teams entered from 4 of the venues with 40 children taking part.

- Belvoir Bees project will continue at 7 venues. We plan to introduce award scheme and continue with a summer tournament between venues.
- The sessions will also be used to further encourage volunteer engagement and community integration.
- To continue the development of junior cricket for 11 + the Trust will continue to work closely with local clubs in supporting them until they become self-sufficient in running their own junior cricket.
- The Trust will also support Belvoir Bees venues in working with the English and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) and nurturing relationships with the regional ECB Boards to develop and grow these Cricket Clubs.



Cricket and Countryside School Days

1,522 children taking part in 19 days; 3,044hrs of sports education and 3,805hrs of countryside education delivered.

- helping schools to offer a varied curriculum and enthuse children about countryside and sports activities.
- giving the opportunity for city primary school children to visit the countryside
- introducing children to the game of cricket.



The Cricket & Countryside School Days give schools the opportunity to bring their students to the Belvoir Estate to take part in outdoor leaning, gaining skills and knowledge in cricket and countryside activities. The days assist schools to be able to enhance the delivery of their curriculum and give children the opportunity to learn new skills in a different learning environment.

In the summer of 2014, a total of 31 schools visited giving over 1,500 children $4\frac{1}{2}$ hours of sports and countryside educational activities. The children learnt from specialist ECCB Level 3&2 coaches and local people such as the farmer, woodman, gamekeeper, huntsman, gun-dog handlers and the birds of prey keepers. The days typically included 2 hours sports education and $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours of 'countryside education'.

With the support of Her Grace the Duchess of Rutland, the Belvoir Estate staff and local volunteers over 361 hours of volunteer time was spent with the children.

The Trust continually strives to improve the days. Of the feedback/evaluation forms returned following their visit 100% of the schools rated the day excellent, their objectives for the day were fully met and that they would return again.

- Continue to extend the reach of the Trust to include schools from within an area of 25 miles around Belvoir Castle where the school days will be used to promote all the Bees venues.
- Look to partner with other similar organisations that deliver 'outside' education.
- Work closely with the Schools to enhance the educational and lifestyle messages that are delivered and where possible look to twin schools from different backgrounds (i.e. small rural schools with larger, multi-cultural inner city schools).
- The Trust are continuing to look to increase participation from rural & Inner City Schools in the days.



Teach Cricket Programme

Providing 138 children with 966 hours of high quality sports coaching across 7 weeks.

- Enhancing schools' sports curriculum delivery and after-school club provision
- Providing exit routes for children to continue with out-of-school sport.
- Providing CPD opportunities for school staff.

Our in-school programme works with rural schools to enhance their sports curriculum provision providing cricket opportunities for children.

Cricket is all inclusive and not only provides physical education but can also contribute to the curriculum in many ways:

- Physical education (playing cricket, learning skills)
- English (match reports, verbal communication)
- ICT (scoring, scorecards / books)
- Mathematics (scoring, run rates, strategy)
- Citizenship (rules, responsibility, teamwork and individual contribution, etiquette, strategy, diplomacy)
- Personal, social and health education (role models, active and healthy lifestyle)



During 2014 the programme was delivered in 7 Vale of Belvoir primary schools, all of which were outside the boundaries / catchment for the well-known Chance to Shine project. Our programme was over a 7 week period, each school received weekly cricket coaching sessions during the summer.

The project was supported by The Cricket Society Trust who raise funds to:

"...broaden the horizons of those youngsters through understanding the values that cricket can bring to their lives... We are pleased to help Darren and his team develop programmes which will enhance opportunities for youngster's to appreciate how cricket can be both fun and educational." - We are planning to extend this project to more schools delivering a shorter programme to each school and include a tournament at the end of the programme.
- Exit routes for opportunities for further participation out of school at the local Belvoir Bee's junior cricket sessions will be promoted to all children.



Special Needs Schools Programme

334 children with 1,394 hours of active sport and 142 education hours

Our special needs school days and in-school cricket coaching throughout the winter were again supplemented with a project of table cricket that enabled children with severe physical disabilities to participate in cricket.

The table cricket element was complimented by a 'finals day' held at the Lee Westwood Sports Centre at Nottingham University which was supported by 9 schools. This was delivered in partnership with the Nottinghamshire County Cricket Club – and was a huge success. We aim to repeat it in 2015.

Over a 5 week period (February - March), 9 schools each received weekly cricket coaching from Trust Director Darren Bicknell, with on average 30 children taking part at each school.

The programme continued with these children by giving them the opportunity of taking part in the Cricket and Countryside School Days at the Belvoir Estate during the summer.

'Ash Lea School is pleased to continue their link with Belvoir Castle Cricket Club again this year. The provision of coaching in school allows the pupils to receive coaching from specialists. It gives them the opportunity to experience and learn cricket and to be part of a team. The visit to the cricket club extends that opportunity to put their cricketing skills in to practice in an authentic setting and to have a fun day out in the countryside. The visit to the castle is often a highlight of the day, especially when animals are involved!'









- 68 volunteers delivered 1,086 volunteer hours
- involving adults in volunteering, enabling them to actively contribute to their local community.
- giving focused skills training for specific needs of the Trust projects without getting hindered by administration/qualifications
- giving volunteers clear responsibility to help coach without the administrative or responsibility burden associated with helping at a sports club (e.g. can you join the committee; will you ring around the parents; can you organise the fixtures; can you buy the cricket balls; etc.)







The scheme continues to be hugely successful with 68 volunteers (both coaching and education) from the local communities working in the Trust's projects in 2014.

28 volunteers helped on the Belvoir Bees cricket project. The Trust Director delivers training workshops for our cricket volunteers to not only develop their knowledge of cricket but their communication and teaching skills & techniques.

The Trust ensures that these volunteer hours are spent on direct contact hours with the children and not on administrative tasks. Additional volunteers have also come forward to help with fundraising and administration such as child registration at sessions.

- Continue to increase our volunteer network through communication and actively engaging with the parents and local community, whilst continuing to develop lead coaches at each of the venues.
- We will also assist in developing and nurturing members of the local cricket clubs to enable those clubs to continue in the development of junior cricket.
